It's dark inside a fire, said Roslyn Fire Lieutenant Josh Rice. "You can't see anything. You go with your other senses – you can feel where the heat is. You use your thermal imaging camera to cut through the smoke. You rely on your training and your team."

Donning his turnout gear, riding a firetruck with sirens blaring, and using his skills to put out a fire never stops being exciting, Josh said, and there's nothing as rewarding as helping his neighbors.

"I have been able to help put out fires before they spread, so that peoples' homes weren't too damaged," he said. "People are always so thankful."

At just 25 years old, Josh is already a fire company lieutenant with 11 years of volunteer experience.

"I started out as an Explorer with Roslyn as soon as I turned 14, then was a Junior Firefighter from 16 to 18, when I became a full firefighter," said Josh.

Explorers learn about firefighting by watching firefighters train and participating in ageappropriate ways. Juniors gain even more handson experience, training with full firefighters and assisting them on many calls.

Josh started going to the firehouse long before he turned 14. His father, Mike, volunteered with Roslyn for many years and all five Abington Township Fire Department (A.T.F.D.) fire companies are family-friendly places. "I really grew up going to the firehouse. I saw what my dad was doing and it interested me, so once I was old enough, I volunteered, too."

Hardly anyone walks through the big bay doors of the Abington, McKinley, Weldon, Edge Hill, or Rosyln fire companies knowing how to be a firefighter. The training required to rescue people from burning buildings, extinguish fires, extricate people who are trapped in vehicles, and so much more, is provided to volunteers at no cost. It's important to train, and also a lot of fun, Josh said - especially when the A.T.F.D. has its own cutting-edge training facility right here in Abington Township.

"I've learned everything that I have learned from being able to go that training facility," said Josh, who works for the Upper Moreland Township Public Works Department. "It's something I'm proud of," he said. "I wasn't always the best school student, and the fire department gave me structure and helped me mature. Being in the fire company helps you develop self confidence."

Josh said anyone looking for a meaningful way to help the community should consider joining the A.T.F.D. "It's a life-changing experience, and you also make friends for a lifetime," he said.



McAneney, Abington's Director of Fire & Emergency Management Services.

Becoming a junior firefighter builds confidence and friendships. It may launch a career in first response or public service. It helps teens stand out on job or college applications.
